Frequently Asked Questions-

Who do I select a committee member?

If you have a faculty member work extensively with you on a class project, they are often a good choice to be on your committee. You can check background bios of faculty members to look for their area of research and what you want to do in your project. Have a clear idea of what you want to do for your graduation project.

How do I request a committee member?

Start with the person you would like to be acting chair of your committee. Ask if they would be able to serve on your committee. Discuss with them your ideas for other committee members. Listen carefully, they know details you might not know and what guidance you will need to succeed. With approval of your primary committee member, then ask any additional members.

If I request a committee member, will they automatically be able to help me? No. Everyone is very busy, and they might not have room in their schedule to be able to help you. Be respectful of their time and if it doesn't work, they may have suggestions on who else could be on your committee.

What if I ask someone and I don't hear back?

If you don't hear back in a few business days, then we recommend you try again. Make sure your email is clear and concise. Tell them what part of the project you would appreciate their guidance and give them an approximate timeline (e.g., what semester are you starting the project, when do you plan to finish).

Can I have more than two people on a Plan B committee? Yes, you can have additional committee members. This is helpful if you have a complex project or you need guidance from two non-tenure track faculty.
